

# How to Make a College Plan

**Grade levels:** 8th–12th grade

**Time required:** 20 minutes



## Materials needed:

- A computer with Internet access.
- Access to this URL: <http://bigfuture.org/make-a-plan>
- (Optional) An email address to create a free College Board account or get login help.



## Student objectives:

- Successfully create and save a personal college road map.
- Successfully complete a first college planning step.



## Tips before you begin:

1. To save time, help students create an account or log in to an existing account before they start.
2. Students can view and interact with a plan without logging in, but they need to be signed in to save a plan or check off an activity as complete.
3. Give the students a specific activity to complete that's appropriate for their season and grade. It should be one that they can complete immediately—for example, by viewing a related video.
4. Note that some activities have multiple steps before they're considered "done."



## Classroom discussion topics (optional):

1. Discuss things that students are worried about as they think about college planning—for example, the cost of college, the pressure to choose the "right" college.
2. Discuss things that students are excited about when they think about college—for example, learning new things, or the social life. Talk about how these interests can turn into college search criteria.
